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
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The Chief's Corner


Congratulations! to Captain Matthew Harris who successfully completed the 2025 Leadership Oshkosh class!



The Oshkosh Police Department successfully completed year three (of a 4-year cycle) for its CALEA (Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies) web-based assessment, which was done in December 2024. During the assessment, CALEA personnel reviewed a portion of the required standards to ensure the department's compliance with nationally recognized law enforcement best practices. The Oshkosh Police Department successfully completed this assessment and continues to work toward receiving full CALEA accreditation.

CALEA assessments occur annually remotely over a 4-year cycle. A CALEA Assessor will remotely view documentation from June 20-28, 2025, for year 4 of the assessment. Final preparations are being made for the mid-August onsite visit where CALEA Assessors will visit on site and assess the department for continued accreditation.

We are currently in year four (of a 4-year cycle) for WILEAG (Wisconsin Law Enforcement Accreditation Group), with the next site-based assessment scheduled for Spring 2026. The assessments are a continuing process and the department continues to work toward receiving full accreditation from both CALEA and WILEAG.

In 2025, the Professional Standards Division has been busy planning and hosting trainings for our officers and others from around the state and the country. We have hosted the following courses so far in 2025 with many more planned for the second half of the year:

The training has also brought in agencies from across the state and country, which helps showcase the City of Oshkosh and makes a local economic impact. Our officers have attended various other trainings both locally and across the state. We have also conducted a number of in-house training days with topics including, CPR/First Aid, Frauds and Scams, DAAT refresher, Taser recertification and Firearms training just to list a few.

In May, we also had three of our Mobile Field Force Officers attend IPMBA (International Police Mountain Bike Association) training, conducted by Officer Kopczyk, to enhance our abilities to police events such as Pub Crawl.

We have many more trainings, which we are hosting in the second half of 2025 and are starting to plan for 2026!

PATROL DIVISION

2nd Shift

With the new year, it brought new faces to the 2nd shift. We welcome Sergeant Kyle Roberts, Officer Kaylee Raabe, and Officer Aaron Petkovsek. Sergeant Roberts comes to us after many years on 3rd shift, bringing a wealth of technical and tactical knowledge. As a former Field Training Officer, current DAAT instructor, and SWAT Team Leader, Sergeant Roberts has the ideal background to coach, train, and develop new officers for their career with the Oshkosh Police Department. Both Officers Raabe and Petkovsek were hired at the end of 2024 and completed the department's Field Training and Evaluation Program (FTEP). Each has been assigned to the 1p-11p shift and assigned to District 3.

During the first few months of the year when calls for service generated by the public were lower, the shift officers were able to engage in several different community events and activities. Officers conducted multiple tours and discussions at the police department with community youth; participated in business and school events; conducted DARE classes, K9 demonstrations, and provided input to advisory boards. Officers also focused this time on individual training in order to better develop and enhance their investigation skills and leadership. A few of those training events attended were: Homemade Explosives (HME): Awareness, Recognition, and Response Course; Wisconsin Law Enforcement Executive Development Association Conference; Conducting Internal Investigations Course; Motorcycle Officer Recertification; Advance Roadside Impaired Driving Enforcement; NTOA Basic Negotiator; Investigations in Cases of Suspected Child Maltreatment; Active Shooter Level 1 Course.

During the first six months of 2025, officers conducted 2,364 traffic stops on the shift. Traffic enforcement continues to be one of our priority self-initiated activities given citizen complaints and general officer observations during their routine patrol. We kindly ask all citizens to slow down, pay attention, and drive defensively. The top citizen-initiated call for service within the first six months has been Welfare Checks with 654 requests for police. Although typically not an incident that has a criminal element, the overall safety of citizens generates a police response to ensure those who are in crisis can achieve the help that they need with the goal being to achieve the safest resolution possible. We are anticipating Officers Raabe and Petkovsek, the shift's only untrained officers in Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, to complete training by the end of this year. CIT training is a 40-hour evidence-based behavior health training model focused on first responders. It is one of our core training requirements and is typically provided within the first couple years of employment.

PATROL DIVISION

3rd Shift

Third shift has been very busy with responding to active incidents, addressing quality of life concerns, working on traffic enforcement, and training. We welcomed Officer Alexys Schneider to the shift after she completed her Field Training, and she has been a welcome addition to the shift.

Officers have been diligent with continuing training to stay abreast of the best and most current law enforcement techniques. Officer Schwartz completed his TASER instructor recertification, Officer Hendrickson completed his Firearms Instructor Certification, and Officer Phillips will be completing his Defense and Arrest Tactics Instructor Certification soon. Having certified instructors within the department, and especially on the shift, keeps officers trained on the most current and effective techniques to be as safe as possible in everything that they do. Third shift also has Officer Pierce, Officer Phillips, Officer Rukamp, Officer Hendrickson, and Officer Schwartz who are current Field Training Officers and have been active with instructing new hires. Officer Krause has attended Negotiation Team Training, to best prepare for attending to individuals experiencing personal crisis, or active criminal incidents that may benefit from negotiations to reach a peaceful resolution.

Officers have stayed vigilant at their efforts in crime prevention by conducting regular foot patrols of the City's parks, with a priority on the downtown area, and conducting regular building security checks, especially at those sites actively under construction. Officers have been very busy with responding to calls for service and proactive patrols, but have still made traffic enforcement a priority with 1431 traffic stops since the last newsletter resulting in 647 citations, 69 OWI arrests and numerous other arrests for illegal activities. Our K9 Handlers Sergeant Fox(K9 Odin), Officer Rukamp (K9 Fritz), and Officer Schwartz (K9 Kyo) are very active at detection of illegal narcotics detection, and greatly assist the officers with locating this contraband on our streets. All of our K9/Handler teams have just completed their annual certification, and are ready to go for another year!

Many of the officers also have collateral duties or belong to special teams. Officer Cody Rukamp has instructed CHEERS bartender training classes and worked on Alcohol Sales Enforcement details to make sure that our community is responsibly serving its patrons. Officer Caitlyn Tohak took time to participate in the Bigs with Badges program through Big Brothers Big Sisters. This program pairs officers with juveniles in our community to help create positive relationships with law enforcement. Officer Austin Wunnicke and Officer Austin Magedanz have worked diligently on the recruitment program to help the department locate the best candidates to become Patrol Officers for our community. Officers conduct these duties in addition to their regular Patrol assignments. Third shift also contributes officers to the SWAT Team, Bicycle Patrol Team, Honor Guard Team, and Mobil Field Force.

We look forward to continuing to provide the highest level of law enforcement services that we can to the Great City of Oshkosh. Rest easy, we'll keep the night watch for you!

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The first part of 2025 has proven to be an active one for the Criminal Investigation Division. With the retirement of Captain Becky Kaiser, newly promoted Captain Andy Lecker stepped in to command the Operations Bureau. His position was filled by the promotion of Lieutenant Brett Robertson, who has done an exceptional job guiding the division with their case assignments and monitoring investigations. Under his supervision, the two Sergeants, six Detectives, three Vice and Narcotics Investigators, six School Resource Officers, the Crime Prevention/Public Affairs Officer, and the Crime Analyst have been kept very busy.



CID members, along with the Vice and Narcotics Unit and Patrol have conducted investigations into human trafficking operations, shooting and weapons incidents, vehicle break-ins, and significant drug investigations. As a result of these investigations, human trafficking victims are receiving resources, a sex offender has been federally indicted for child pornography, suspects have been arrested in several of our shooting/weapons incidents, and significant

amounts of illegal drugs, guns and cash have been seized and taken off our streets. These are just some of the examples of how our teams are working together to rid our city of illicit drugs and criminal activities that negatively impact the quality of life for our citizens. We're working hard to make Oshkosh a safe city to live, work, and play!

National Human Trafficking Awareness Day







Officer Krause took the lead on communicating with the patient and allowed her to attempt to walk, but when she almost fell, the patient was carried to her cot. Officer Krause kept the patient as calm as possible and was empathetic while still ensuring the patient received all care possible and getting the most information possible. I was impressed with Officer Krause's ability to comfort the patient while still remaining adamant about the needs of the situation like medical care and transport. Officer Krause was able to assist in acquiring patient demographics and even was able to provide photos of the scene to the receiving hospital, which significantly aided my description of what was witnessed.

Officer Miles Bennett & Oshkosh Police Department:


Chief Smith received a card of thanks from a grateful citizen regarding the death of a loved one:
